From the latest UNAIDS report, we learn that new HIV infections and AIDS- related deaths are declining in Sub-Saharan Africa. The drop in infections is a result of the positive impact of 'combination' HIV prevention, an approach that combines public education, access to condoms and other prevention technologies. It also results from reduction in stigmatization of PLWHIV and those at high risk of infection like youth, along with policies that have promoted personal responsibility in all matters related to health.

This is what African Action on AIDS was doing, in partnership with the Public Affairs Section of the US Embassy in Yaoundé, on 17 February 2010 as part of the celebration of YOUTH DAY. While this process was going on, we were all surprised, but happy and immensely proud to see H.E. Janet E. Garvey, the US Ambassador. She decided, within her heavy schedule, to spare sometime for this community effort!

As President Bill Clinton says in his book, GIVING, "While we don't all have the same amount of money, we do have access to the same 24 hours in every day. Though some people have much less free time than others, nearly everyone can carve out some opportunity for giving. The gift of time can sometimes be more satisfying and more valuable than money".
